

Did you know that Family Involvement is...



Any activity that parents do with and on behalf of the education of their children in the home and school environments.

Summary of the Research

- Research has shown that there is a positive correlation between parental involvement and student achievement. In fact, "the family makes critical contributions" to their child's academic success (Henderson & Berla, 1994, p.14).
- The home environment is the "hidden curriculum" that provides a foundation for children's readiness to learn and academic success (Walberg, 1984).

Summary of the Research


- Family involvement minimizes the disconnection between the home and school environments (Zigler & Berman, 1983).
- The relationship between family involvement and academic success holds across families of all economic, ethnic, and educational backgrounds (Henderson & Mapp, 2002).
- Family involvement benefits parents too. They feel more capable as a parent and as an advocate for their child (Davies, 1993).

Epstein's Overlapping Spheres of Influence

When the student, family, and school spheres operate in conjunction with one another, student attitude and achievement improve (Becker & Epstein, 1982).



Epstein's Framework of Six Types of Parental Involvement

1. Parenting and basic obligations of the family

- Provide for child's health and safety
- Utilize positive parenting practices
- Provide home conditions that support educational growth

2.Communication and basic obligations of the school

- Responsibility to communicate with families while respecting parental language and literacy issues regarding:
 - School programming
 - Child progress
 - Family Concerns

3. Volunteering and parental involvement in the school

- Efforts are made by the school to match parent interests and schedules to needs of students, teachers, and administrators
- Parents assist in the classroom setting or school building

Epstein's Framework of Six Types of Parental Involvement cont.

4. Family involvement in learning activities in the home

- Teacher guidance and support
- Parents assist children with learning activities such as:
 - Homework
 - Other activity that is an extension of classroom based learning

5. Family involvement in decision making at school

- School community level
- Parent Teacher Organization

6.Community involvement and collaboration

Family Perspective



Benefits of Family Engagement

Academic:

- Strong predictor of academic achievement
- Higher reading and test scores, lower chance of grade retention
- Increase in child motivation to learn
- Protective factor in counteracting risk conditions associated with underachievement (Miedel & Reynolds, 1999).

School-Home Communication

- Minimizes the disconnection between school and home
- Parents have a clearer understanding of what is expected at school
- Higher parental involvement is equated with increase in teacher outreach

Parental Efficacy

 Increase in parental understanding and confidence in how they can influence and enhance learning at home (Davies, 1993).

Challenges of Family Engagement

Parental history

- Unsuccessful education as a child
- Undiagnosed disability
- Unresponsive school system

Educator is viewed as the primary expert in their child's learning

Cultural/language considerations

- Uncertainty of role, do not want to interfere
- Unavailability of information in a family's first language

Logistical

- Family time
- Work schedule
- Child care and transportation issues

Educational Perspective



Benefits of Family Engagement

Staff

- More effective teachers
- Higher job performance
- Better job satisfaction
- Teachers report more positive acknowledgement for their work
- Increase in student academic achievement

School to Home Connection

- Creates a climate of good will and trust
- Increase in effective communication
- Parents more responsive to teacher feedback

Challenges of Family Engagement

Staff

- Disagreement about the family role in the educational setting
- Claim interest but give family limited means to participate
- Time

School to Home Connection

- Staff have not been adequately trained to communicate and work with parents.
- Parents do not understand school work that is being sent home.
- School communicates with family only when there is a problem

Key Strategies to Build and Enhance Family Involvement



"The strongest and most consistent predictor of parent involvement at home and school are specific school programs and teacher practices that encourage and guide parent involvement" (Dauber & Epstein, 1993, p. 61).

Physical Environment



How do we look? How do we say "Welcome"!

- The physical space is well lit inside and out

- Directional signs in the physical space are:
 - Pointing to the office, classrooms and restrooms
 - In the languages represented by families

How does our school "work"?

- A structure is in place that parents understand
- The school culture is demystified when mission, policies, and expectations are communicated to families verbally and in writing.

- The reciprocity of ideas between school staff and family's are acknowledged and honored.

- Relationship building
 - Is proactive and initiated by all staff

- Communication
 - All Staff have an integral role in building and enhancing the school to home connection
 - Teaching staff have a pivotal role in communication
 - Is ongoing and circular

Training Component and Topics

- Provide explicit staff development in engaging and involving families
 - Relationship development and enhancement
 - How to communicate and work with families
 - Verbally
 - In writing
- Provide ongoing opportunities to learn how to work with families facing challenges e.g. divorce, family violence, substance abuse, poverty, homelessness
