Starting school is so exciting!

This activity calendar will help your child get ready for that special time.

Important things to know:

All children are different and learn at their own pace. This calendar will help you plan activities that will help your child get the skills needed to start school. Children do better in school if they know more than just letters, numbers, colors, and shapes. They should have good social and physical skills, and enjoy learning new things. The checklist below will guide you as you work with your child to build those skills and get ready for school.

How to use this calendar:

The activities in this calendar are designed for 3, 4 and 5 year olds. They will keep your child busy and learning from August to July. Use this calendar as a guide for fun ideas, but make up some of your own activities, too. Be sure to include other family members and friends. Have a wonderful year together getting ready for the big day - going to school!

The daily activities in this calendar are color coded by skill area:

Social emotional are purple, language development are dark blue,

fine motor are green, gross motor are black, literacy are orange,

math are dark red, science-light purple and holidays and events are red.

Many of the activities listed are vague and the detailed directions can be found on Pinterest - search Montelores Early Childhood Council and then calendar activities.

Having fun is an important part of learning! Your child learns best when doing fun and interesting things with you!

How Young Children Learn

Children love to learn. They learn best through hands-on activities. In their early years, they use their senses - touch, smell, sight, hearing and taste - to understand the world around them.

It is our job, as parents, to make learning fun and enjoyable at every age. This helps your children develop physical skills, language, thinking and social skills that are so important for their success in school.

School Readiness Checklist

This checklist can help you get ready for school. Don't worry if your child can't do everything on the list right now. Remember that every child grows and develops at different rates.

Good Health and Well-Being: My child:

Make every day a "Learning Day" with your child!

Surprising colors-Gauguin 1848-1903

Tape the sides of the paper with masking tape. You will peel this off later and create a natural frame.

Have children paint a scene and use colors that are opposite to the real colors.

Trees are usually green, Paint them pink. The ocean is blue paint it yellow. Etc.



Create Routines

Have a set bedtime and wake up time, and stick to it. This helps children know what to expect and ensures they get enough sleep.

This collage was completed when geometric shapes were cut from tissue paper and applied to a sheet of wax paper. Using liquid starch, watered down glue, or Mod Podge, liberally apply the starch to the wax paper with a brush or dip shapes into the starch and place on paper. Allow to dry.



Read Books:

Read to your child every day. When reading, ask the questions "Who?" "What?" "When?" and "Where?" to help your child with comprehension. Ask him to predict what will happen next. He can tell you what he sees in the the illustrations and expand on the story through the pictures.

Using the end of a pair of scissors or an unbent paperclip, one may create an etching of any shape they desire...perfect for homemade holiday cards."



Shape Practice:

Have your child point out and name shapes in your house and outside environment. Cutting out shapes with scissors is great for both recognition and fine motor skills.



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This detail is taken from a 3-D project that will allow you to use some of those foam blocks that you wonder how to repurpose. Toothpicks, pipe cleaners, beads, a key, and play dough were available for this artist. Use your imagination when it comes to which materials to use.



Color Practice:

Discuss colors of things in the world around you such as the sky, the grass, cars, house, clothing, etc. When they get good at naming colors, try playing "I Spy."

Pick out several colors of paint. Place some paint in a shallow dish. A dish for each color.

Cut several pieces of yarn or string. Then put the string in the paint. Place a paper on the floor and then stand above the paper and drop the string with paint on it. Let it fall into its natural shape. Gently pick it up and drop a different color. repeat until your masterpiece is complete.



Parts of the Body:

Sing the song "Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes." Ask your child questions such as "What body part do we use to smell, taste, etc?"



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This artwork was inspired by painting to the sounds of music and created by multiple children. Roll out a long piece of butcher paper, grab some paints, and play some music. You can use fingers, brushes, sponges to paint with. Play fast music, slow music. See what comes about.



Sink or Float?

Provide objects such as cork, crayon, cotton ball, feather, toy car, plastic Easter egg, etc. ask about what the objects are made of. Set up a large bowl, the sink or tub filled with water. One-by one, have your child pick up an item and predict whether it will sink or float. Place each item on top of the water and observe what happens. You can chart the findings.

#### Social Readiness:

Social readiness is as important as academic readiness. Being able to get along with other children, follow directions, take turns, and say "good-bye" to parents are skills that kindergarten teachers hope to see from incoming children.

This masterpiece was achieved by applying tempura paint to a piece of empty white newsprint and then rolling a toy truck across the sheet. Using the primary colors (red, blue, and yellow) will allow for the scientific discovery of color mixing when the secondary colors (purple, green and orange) appear. Explore using items with interesting textures.

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#### Independence:

When children complete basic self-help tasks such as zipping their coats or tying their shoes, they feel a great sense of pride. Independence builds confidence and self- esteem. In school, children will be expected to do many things on their own, so give them opportunities to practice independence at home.
